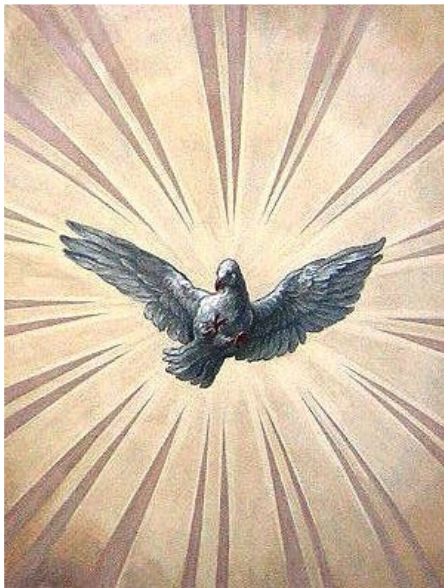


Pentecost Sunday
