SUDAN - In war-torn Sudan, every other person needs humanitarian aid. Far from the eyes of the world, a ten-month civil war in Sudan has robbed its people of everything: their safety, their homes, and their livelihoods. They were fleeing violence and a catastrophic humanitarian situation triggered by the outbreak of civil war almost 10 months ago, when the paramilitary RSF Forces attacked the ruling military junta and its army in the struggle for power. CAFOD Sudan, a partner of the Catholic Church's aid organization Caritas, is struggling to provide basic necessities to a population in which "every second person" needs humanitarian assistance. With over 15,000 lives lost and 10 million displaced, the devastating impact of the ten-month-long conflict in Sudan is laid bare. Nearly 17.7 million people are acutely food insecure, with 4.9 million in emergency levels of acute food insecurity between October 2023 and February 2024

GAZA - In the six months since Israel mounted its military operation in the Gaza Strip to counter a Hamas attack mounted from Gaza, the Palestinian territory's infrastructure has been dealt a crippling blow. Beyond the more than thirty thousand dead, Palestinians of all ages are at risk of starvation, and famine looms in the region.

HAITI - United Nations report, armed gang violence has caused over 50,000 people to flee the capital in recent weeks, adding to over 100,000 refugees already in southern Haiti.

POPE FRANCIS - The Pope gave a solemn accounting of a world in crisis, using the pulpit of his Easter address to renew calls for a cease-fire in Gaza while drawing attention to other conflicts, from Ukraine to Haiti, heightened risks of famine, the threat of climate change and the plight of migrants. "How much suffering we see in the eyes of the children: The children in those lands at war have forgotten how to smile! With those eyes, they ask us: Why? Why all this death? Why all this destruction?"

My fear is they might keep on requesting us to host future meetings always because of the good food the CWL serve. EASTER SEASON - The word "Easter" comes from Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world. The Paschal Candle used during the Easter Vigil is a central symbol of this divine light, which is Christ. It is kept throughout Easter Time and lit for all liturgical celebrations. The season of Easter is the most important of all liturgical times, which Catholics celebrate as the Lord's resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit (Pentecost Day) upon the Church.

PASCHAL (Easter) CANDLE - It is an ancient symbol of the risen Savior. Its light represents Christ's victory over death and darkness, and the hope Christ brings to the faithful. In the center of the candle is a cross, which symbolizes the sacrifice of Jesus and his victory over death. The letters Alpha & Omega represent that Jesus is the beginning and the end, indicating his eternity and constant presence in our lives. The current year inscribed on the Paschal Candle reminds us of the continuity of faith and the presence of Christ throughout all time. Inserted in the shape of a cross, the five grains symbolize the five wounds of Jesus and his sacrificial love for us. The Paschal Candle re-



mains lit during all the liturgical celebrations during the Easter season until Pentecost Sunday, to remember the presence of the Risen Christ among us. During Baptism Paschal candle is lit to signify that the baptized being "born again" and receive new life, now share in the light of Christ becoming part of his body, the Church. The Paschal Candle is also placed and lit near the casket at the funeral Mass as a reminder that the baptized share in the victory of Christ over sin & death. Romans14:8 tells us, "If we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord. Whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord." That explains why paschal candle, which symbolizes Christ Jesus as light to everyone's life is seen lighted during our baptism (when we start to live with the Lord) and during funeral (when we die back to the Lord).
